Manager Comments: Greetings everyone.

Summer Theater: As I mentioned last weekend, Dennis Canty, son of Tom and Jane Canty, 1292 Birch Road, is a student at the U.of Mass studying Educational Theatre. He is also the Artistic Director and Executive Producer of a traveling educational theatre troupe called Imagination on Wheels. This year they are bringing to life six classic children's stories and he has offered to bring his program to Frye Island.

Unfortunately they will only be able to put on one performance on the Island. This will be held on Friday evening at 8:00 PM at the Community Center. The show only lasts about 90 minutes so bring all the kids. I am sure it will be an enjoyable evening for all.

Beaches: The FII Board of Directors is establishing a Beach Committee to review existing policies and establish new policies for the Beaches. Dick Giggey has volunteered to chair the committee. Anyone interested in serving on this committee should leave their name in the office.

Hazardous Household Waste: We are again participating with other local communities in the household hazardous waste pick-up day. This year it will be Saturday August 2nd. There is a list further in the FINS identifying what you can and cannot bring to the brush dump. Everything for this pick-up must be there before the dump closes on Friday August 1st so that we can get it to Raymond Saturday morning.

Police Activity: Last week we had a wallet stolen at the café. The wallet was later found but almost \$100.00 in cash was missing. Last week also seemed to be the weekend for vandalism. The dump was struck again. Glass was broken all over, paint cans were opened and sprayed around and trash was spread everywhere. But much more

serious were the signs that were stolen. We just spent more than \$1500.00 of your tax dollars to replace the signs that were taken and there are still more we need to purchase. This theft included a number of stop signs. I am sure (or at least I hope) these juvenile delinquents didn't realize the potential consequences but many of you may recall a similar activity in Florida a few years ago. In that particular case some teenagers stole a stop sign. Shortly after, an automobile went through that intersection without stopping and the occupants were killed. Those teenagers are now serving time in jail. I can assure you, if anyone is hurt because of some of these pranks, the perpetrators will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law. The part that I find the most difficult to understand is the response of some of the parents. I remember growing up, when I strayed from the straight and narrow, I was much more concerned about the reaction from my parents then I was from anyone else. Now, quite often we are accused of "harassing" these kids. Sooner or later these people are going to have to accept the responsibility for their actions.

12 TIPS TO FIRE SAFETY

COMPLEMENTS OF THE FRYE ISLAND FIRE DEPARTMENT

1. INSTALL AND MAINTAIN SMOKE DETECTORS

Smoke detectors warn you of a fire in time for you to escape. Install them on each level of your home and outside of each sleeping area. Test them every month, following the manufacturer's directions. Replace the batteries once a year, or whenever a detector chirps to signal that the battery is low. Don't ever borrow the detector's batteries for other use – a disabled smoke detector can't save your life.

2. SMOKERS NEED WATCHING

Carelessly discarded cigarettes are the leading cause of fire deaths in North America. Never smoke in bed or when you are sleepy. Provide large deep ashtrays. Wet butts before placing them in the trash. If you are having a party, have a designated smoking area and be particularly careful.

3. BE CAREFUL WHEN COOKING

Never leave cooking unattended. Keep the cooking area clear of combustibles, and wear short or tight fitting sleeves when you cook. Keep the handles of your pots and pans turned inward so they can't be knocked over. If grease catches fire, carefully slide a lid over the pan to smother the flames. Never use water on a grease fire – it will only spread the flames. Have an appropriate fire extinguisher available for small fires.

4. COOL A BURN

If someone gets burned, immediately place the burned area in cool water for 10-15 minutes. Do not use butter or other home remedies. All burns are potentially dangerous, especially to children and the elderly. Seek professional medical assistance when needed.

5. MATCHES AND LIGHTERS ARE TOOLS

In the hands of children, matches and lighters are deadly. Use child-resistant lighters, and store all matches and lighters up high where kids can't reach them. Teach your children from the start that matches and lighters are tools for adults, not toys for kids.

6. USE ELECTRICITY SAFELY

If an appliance smokes or has an unusual odor, unplug it right away and have it repaired or replaced. Replace any electrical cord that is cracked or frayed and don't run electrical cords under rugs. Don't overload outlets or extension cords. Don't tamper with fuse boxes or circuit breakers – have a qualified electrician perform any needed electrical work.

7. SPACE HEATERS NEED SPACE

Keep portable and space heaters at least three (3) feet from anything that can burn. Never leave a heater on when you are not home or when you go to bed. Keep children and pets well away from space heaters.

8. PLAN AND PRACTICE TO ESCAPE

Even if you have lived in your home for 20 years or more, in a house fire you will not know where you are. The smoke is blinding and toxic and it will kill you long before the flames get to you. As a family, plan an escape route. Plan two ways out of each room. Choose a meeting place outside where everyone will gather. Practice your plan at least twice a year and make it realistic.

If fire breaks out in your home, you have to get out fast. Don't stop for anything. Do not try to rescue possessions or pets. Go directly to your meeting place and call the fire department from a neighbor's house. Once you are out, stay out and don't re-enter the house. The heat and smoke of a fire are overpowering. If people are trapped, the firefighters have the best chance of rescuing them. Practice your plan at least twice a year.

8. STAY LOW AND GO!

Smoke is dangerous. It claims more lives than the fire that makes it. Try to exit away from the smoke if possible. If this can't be done, get down on the floor and crawl out of the area. Crawl on your hands and knees, keeping your head low to the floor. Smoke contains deadly gases and heat rises. During a fire, cleaner air will be near the floor. It will be easier to see and breathe and it will be cooler.

10. TEST DOORS BEFORE OPENING

While kneeling or crouching at the door, reach up as high as you can and touch the door, the knob and the space between the door and the frame with the back of your hand. If the door is hot, use another escape route. If the door is cool, open it with caution and check the condition outside.

11. WHAT TO DO WHEN TRAPPED

If you find yourself trapped, close all doors between you and the fire. Stuff the cracks around the door with clothing or towels to keep the smoke out. Wait by a window and signal for help. If there is a phone in the room, call the fire department and tell them exactly where you are. Stay on the phone with them if possible.

12. STOP DROP AND ROLL

Everyone should know how to **STOP DROP** and **ROLL**. If your clothes catch fire, don't run! **Stop** where you are, **drop** to the ground, cover your face with your hands to protect your face and lungs, and **roll** over and over to smother the flames.





HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE

What is Household Hazardous Waste?

Household Hazardous Waste is any product that is classified as toxic (poisonous), corrosive, flammable, or reactive (explosive). Such products can be found in homes, garages, or work-shops. When improperly disposed of, it can poison people, animals and can pollute homes and the natural environment. Many of these can be identified by reading labels. Look for the words: poison, corrosive, caution, flammable, danger, or warning.



Cost:
Will depend on quantity of waste delivered. Each Town will provide subsidies on a first come first serve basis.

Pre-registration is recommended. In previous years, costs have ranged between \$10 and \$20 per 5 gallons of waste. For more information please call your Town Office.

How do I transport these materials?

Bring materials in original containers, be sure they are securely closed.

Pack containers in sturdy upright boxes and pad with newspaper.

Never Mix Chemicals Together !!!

Never smoke or eat while handling or transporting hazardous materials. Leaking or broken containers must be contained. Leave pets at home. Pack your car and drive directly to the sight.
