Island Manager Comments

Greetings Everyone: For those of you who were not able to be here, last week was a busy time on the Island.

FII Stockholders Meeting: I will try to briefly summarize the meeting for those of you that were unable to attend:

A motion was presented and approved by the FII stockholders, should the stockholders vote to offer to convey selected assets to the Town of Frye Island, that would insure appropriate covenants be established to require the Town of Frye Island to give final control and budgeting responsibility to the Board of Island Trustees and responsibility for the operation of all conveyed assets to the Executive Committee.

Asset Transfer:

- A motion to authorize the Board of Directors to offer to convey the Marina and Quail Circle to the Town passed 273 for; 142 opposed
- A motion to authorize the Board of Directors to offer to convey the Frye Island Golf Course to The Town passed 288 for; 127 opposed.
- A motion to authorize the Board of Directors to offer to convey Lot #1 and the Admin Bldg / Store to the Town passed 316 for; 99 opposed.
- A motion to authorize the Board of Directors to offer to convey Lot #2 and the Post Office Building / Old Fire Barn passed 319 for; 96 opposed.
- A motion that the Corporation ratifies and affirms the past actions of the stockholders and the Board of Directors passed 322 for; 90 opposed.

The three names that were chosen from the FII stockholders for their participation in the vote were:

- Ken Hanchett Lot 289/290 Leisure \$100.00
- Greg Tedford Lot 208 Leisure \$75.00
- Ed Johnson Lot 1681 Ridge \$50.00

Congratulations to these three winners and thanks to all who participated. The checks will be in the office this weekend if you want to pick them up. If they are still here Monday we will mail them out.

Town Meeting / Bit Meeting: The town meeting was also held as part of the Island meeting last Saturday. At that meeting the Board of Island Trustees and the Town voters accepted the properties that the FII stockholders offered. We will now work with the Town officials, the FII Board of Directors and our attorney to draft the transfer documents. In addition, all of the other articles on the warrant were approved. I would like to thank everyone for their participation in the meeting. We estimate that there were approximately two hundred Islanders that attended the meeting.

Transfer Station: The transfer station fee schedule was approved at the Town meeting. This fee schedule will become effective January 1st 2005. The revenues anticipated from these fees will be reflected in the budget for 2005.

Insurance: The Bit / Town voters authorized us to solicit costs from the Maine Municipal Association for property and casualty insurance as well as workers compensation insurance. We will work with their representatives to determine if changing insurance carriers would be cost effective for Frye Island.

Erosion and Sediment Control Projects: John Crosby and I met with representatives from the Portland Water District to review a number of areas on the Island where we must address erosion and sediment run off issues. The Water District has established a program where they will provide matching grants of up to \$2500.00 for approved projects to mitigate erosion / sediment problems. The areas we will be addressing include sediment control at the Long Beach Marina, at the intersection of North Beach Road and Leisure Lane (opposite beach #6), and at Beach #3. In addition, we will need to repair the overflow system at the intersection of Leisure Lane and Birch Road and we have to address the erosion occurring at Beach #10. The Water District will prepare reports on these areas for us identifying the problems and suggested repairs. We will then apply for the grants and will plan to do the work after Labor Day. While we were reviewing the area around the boat launch at the Marina, we were also informed that parking along the Marina causeway road was not permitted. The only approved parking when the Water District approved the construction of the Marina was the upper parking lot. They stated that any leaking fluids, (gas, oil etc.), would migrate to the water. In addition, parking on the side of the roadway will damage or kill the vegetation which would contribute to sediment runoff into the water. We will have to review our ordinance to insure we are complying with their requirements.

Taxes, Taxes, Taxes: Don't forget to pay your taxes, lien notices will be sent out and recorded at the registry of deeds during the middle of August for all delinquent taxes.

Fire Works: The fire works were a great success again this year!! I would like to thank everyone at the Marina for moving their boats from the restricted area. Every boat was removed. I know it can be a pain to haul it out of the water, or find another place to put it if you don't use it to view the fire works, but the State Fire Marshall requires this be done in order to have the fire works display. I would also like to thank everyone for contributing to the fund. The fire works would not be possible without your generosity. If you're wondering, we are still \$606.00 short so if you haven't donated and you would like to, we will happily accept your contribution.

Moose on the loose: I mentioned last week that we have a small moose on the Island. Since then, I have had reports that some people, kids I assume, have been seen chasing the moose down the roads in golf carts. If this continues, it is a sure way for someone to get injured. An angry or confused moose is nothing to mess around with. Please use caution and common sense with all wild animals on the Island.

Special Board of Selectmen / EC meeting: There will be a special BoS /EC meeting on Friday July 9th, at 4:00PM in the Administration Office. This meeting is open to all islanders.

Ferry Service: A couple of weeks ago one of the ferry captains offered a very compelling argument for some changes in the way that we load and operate the ferries. These arguments were developed primarily because of safety concerns; safety for the passengers as well as the crews that operate the ferries. The original proposal included using a loading pattern for the ferries consisting of two rows of vehicles, three vehicles long, or 6 vehicles per ferry trip. The ferry crew experimented and determined that, by shuttling with this configuration, they could transport more cars per hour this way than with the existing loading pattern / schedule. Since that time, the crew has also developed a loading pattern that includes 8 vehicles per ferry trip that still provides for the safety of the passengers and crew. This whole effort is somewhat a “work in progress” attempt to provide the best service that we can to everyone that uses the ferry service while providing for their safety as well. We will continue to work on this issue.

I guess I am writing this in defense of the many people that are working very hard to insure that we, who live on the Island, are provided with all of the services that we want and need. This is not only true of the ferry crews but includes the public works employees, employees at the golf course as well as all other Town employees. From some of the comments that I receive, it almost seems that some people think that we spend our time trying to find ways to make the Island less enjoyable. Believe me, that couldn't be further from the truth. I was recently asked to provide the safety history that would justify a change in the loading pattern for the ferries that we have used for many years. Fortunately, I can't do that because we have not had a serious accident. But, the potential is there. And, how responsible would we be if we watched potentially hazardous situations develop but did nothing but react to the inevitable accident. This not only holds true for the ferry service but for the safety of the public on our roads and on the water around the Island as well. Bear with us, some of the things we discuss and attempt will work, some won't but the underlying reason we constantly review our operations is to better serve you, the Islanders; even though it may not appear that way some times. As the Island grows and traffic increases, it is imperative that we continue to review all of our processes.

We will be holding another open meeting at the Community Center on Saturday July 10th at 9:00AM to review the ferry operations and the proposed schedule for the remainder of this year and next. If you have a few minutes, come join us, we appreciate your input.

Police Activity: As I mentioned last week, it seems as though the speeds on our roads are increasing again. Remember, we are in the high season, the population is increasing and more and more people will be using the roads. A golf cart collision with an automobile going 30 or 40 miles per hour could be deadly. Please use caution on the roads whether you are driving, riding or walking. It is not our intention to make it more difficult or less fun for you to get around the Island but it is our intention to see that you do it safely. Last year we issued a lot of warnings, this year we will be issuing citations. And, remember, these are not Town citations; they come with an invitation to visit the Judge in Bridgton.


Ferry News

We want to thank those of you who were so patient this 4th of July weekend. The boats were "taxed to the max" with 2,288 cars making passage during the 1st four days of July. The ferry has transported 20,684 vehicles from April 29 thru July 4th.

These ferries were built 30 + years ago when the personal vehicle was much smaller. As vehicles have grown, the spaces between cars has decreased causing some real concern for safety in an emergency. We will be trying some new and different loading patterns as we go along and when we are running 2 boats, so please don't be alarmed if you see a space on the boat and you're not on it. We are trying to be safe not sorry! Also, we run the 2nd boat for the lion's share of each day, as necessary, so if you miss the boat, PLEASE don't rush the ramp. Wait to pay your fare and be loaded properly. We no longer collect fares on the boat and no one rides for free. In order to keep to a schedule, we have to stop loading and depart the landings on time (exception is when shuttling), so we cannot keep picking up late arrivals. Plan to be at least 5 minutes early for loading.

For a week or less, **five** Frye Island family teams worked and worked hard to design and build their boats to enter in the contest. Congratulations to each of the family members and also to the audience who was on shore to cheer them on. All were amazed at the boats that arrived on July 4th for the judging at Recreation Beach.

The Savage family of Island Road won the "**best construction**" award with their boat, complete with the American flag painted on it. And what they'd especially like you to know about their dingy was that they named it "The Communicator" , in memory of Ronald Reagan. Their boat took six days to build and they said the hardest thing to do was figure out all the cuts on the 2 x 4's. Skip was their best helper.

Congratulations to the Carr family for **running the fastest race** of 24 seconds with their pram, which **also won the most patriotic award**. When planning the design of their boat, they wanted a boat that was narrow enough to paddle on both sides. They like its buoyancy. Grandma Carr says, "Words can't express what a wonderful family event this was." It took three nights to build it.

The Karpacz family won the award for having the **safest and most stable boat**. They especially love the color of their blue row boat. Matthew was the best helper on their team. They said the most fun were the races, in spite of the choppy water.
