Island Manager Comments

Greetings Everyone:

Taxes, Taxes, Taxes: We are rapidly approaching the August 20th time frame when we will be sending lien notices to everyone who is delinquent. If you haven't paid your 2004 taxes, time is running out.

Meetings: There will be a meeting of the Frye Island Inc. Board of Directors meeting at 7:00 PM on Friday August 6th at the Community Center.

There will be a BoS /EC meeting on Sunday, August 8th, at 1:00 PM at the Community Center. These meetings are open to all Islanders.

Lake Level: From some of the comments that I have heard, it appears that I am not explaining the Lake Level situation very well so I am going to take one more stab at it. I promise this will be the last time you will have to read about this from me. Here we go. The S.D.Warren Co. in Westbrook Me. has a license, (which is up for renewal) issued by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC), to operate the Eel Weir dam which controls the flow of water from Sebago Lake to the Presumpscot River. They must control two important parameters as part of this license. One is the level of water in Sebago Lake; the other is the flow of water from the lake to the river. They obviously have no control of the in-flow into the lake. This is primarily from tributaries that flow



into the lake, run off from the snow pack in the spring and rain during the spring, summer and fall seasons. The only real control they have is the flow out of the lake through the dam and into the river. They are charged with controlling the lake level within a defined range while maintaining the flow in the river below a maximum rate to prevent flooding downstream of the dam and a minimum rate to be able to operate the hydroelectric generating station at the dam and to oxygenate the river for fish and aquatic life and other environmental purposes. This is not an easy task at any time but especially this year.


A lake level management plan has been established to identify the desired lake level in anticipation of typical weather events and lake water usage. The level is reduced in the fall and winter to make room for the potential snow pack runoff in the spring and allowed to increase during the spring season to insure there is enough water in the lake to keep the flows in the river above the minimum required rates. As the temperature of the water increases, it holds less oxygen; therefore to keep the river alive, higher flows are required to maintain an acceptable oxygen level. When Mother Nature doesn't cooperate with the anticipatory plan it can have a significant impact on the lake.

Because of heavy snow, rain, and run-off in December 2003, the lake level in January was at the target level of 263.5 ft MSL and the flow from the lake was abnormally high at 140,000 cubic feet per minute (CFM) in an effort to maintain this level. By the end of January, the lake level had dropped to 263.1' and the flows reduced to 20,000 CFM. Through most of January, February, and March, the lake level stayed relatively flat. The weather during this period was, according to the National Weather Service, the second driest in 134 years of record keeping. This prompted S.D. Warren to reduce the flow rate from the lake to 15,000 CFM to help the lake refill. In April and May we had greater amounts of precipitation which resulted in lake levels steadily rising and reaching the target range on May 5th. The lake level peaked on June 3rd at 266.8' MSL and has been decreasing since that date to reach an August 1st target level of 265.15 feet.

There are a number of organizations, primarily homeowner associations, around the lake that are opposed to the higher spring time levels because of the reduction in usable beach frontage and the erosion effects when winds impact the higher lake levels. There are also organizations that prefer the higher levels, primarily commercial entities, i.e. marinas because they need a certain level in the late summer and fall so that boats can get to the marinas and the hydro station because it needs a certain flow in order to operate. I've also heard that there is a need for higher levels at some time during the year to re-fill the wet lands around the lake that support life in these areas. These are all legitimate reasons and your position on this subject will be determined by your needs. This is certainly a very complicated issue with no easy solution. I honestly don't know what the correct water level should be and I'm not sure that there will ever be a plan that will satisfy everyone. The only comment that I made at one of the hearings that I attended was that if the level got below 263 ft MSL we had to prevent ferry access to construction vehicles, which isn't a big deal if you already have a home here, but it definitely is if you don't, and when the level gets below 262 ft MSL our ferries could be resting on the bottom which happened a few years ago.

I have included a chart which identifies the lake level management plan as proposed by the Maine DEP. The rumor that the lake level will be raised on August 1st is not true. The old plan required S.D. Warren to control the lake level at a specific level on August 1st which is impossible to do therefore; the new plan extends a range through this date.

There is no plan to increase the lake level in August. However, the new plan allows S.D. Warren to control in this range which could result in a level a little higher than in previous years and still be in accord with the plan.



Palesky proposal: In June of this year, the voters in Maine approved a referendum article which requires the State to fund 55% of the cost for education. This 55% is a state wide average meaning that some communities may get more funding while others get less but the aggregate has to be 55%.

This November, a new initiative will be on the ballot, which, if passed, will be more critical for Frye Island. This is commonly referred to as the **Palesky Proposal** because Carol Palesky is the driving force behind this property tax initiative. Officially, the sponsor of the proposal is the Maine Taxpayers Action Network. To everyone following the issue, it's the Palesky Initiative.

The initiative has 5 primary elements:

- First, it rolls back all assessed property values to their April 1, 1996 level.
- Second, it limits annual valuation increases to no more than 2%, unless the property is transferred, in which case the town may make a one-time adjustment to bring the value up to market.
- Third, it caps the mil rate at 10, but allows the cap to be exceeded for the purpose of paying debt that was approved by the voters before July 1, 1999. The average municipal mill rate to cover this type of qualifying debt is one-half of one mil.

- Fourth, it attempts to grant towns new authority to raise other taxes or fees which are not based upon property values.
- Fifth, it prohibits the Legislature from amending this new taxation system. All changes would have to be approved by a 2/3 vote at a statewide referendum.

Some of these elements are considered to be unconstitutional and will be challenged if the initiative passes, but the Maine Municipal Association (MMA), an organization of municipalities throughout Maine, has developed a “likely scenario” for each community should this referendum pass.

How would this impact Frye Island? Last year our assessed value was approximately \$85,000,000. With a tax rate of \$16.07 per \$1000.00 of assessed value, we raised approximately \$1,400,000 in taxes to operate the Town. About \$700,000 of that has to go to SAD #6, our share of the cost for education, and a much smaller part approximately \$50,000, goes to Cumberland County. This leaves about \$650,000 to operate the Town.

The Palesky proposal would cap the property taxes at 10% of the assessed value meaning we could only raise about \$850,000 in property taxes. With our tax bill for education at approximately \$700,000 and the county bill at \$50,000, we would be left with about \$100,000 to operate the Town. Many towns have said that they would have to shut down if this proposal passes because they have no other way, other than taxes, to raise money for their operation. Think about it. What would you suggest as a fair way to raise \$650,000, over and above the fees and ferry ticket revenue that we already collect, to fund town operations?

I will discuss this more as we get closer to November.

Emergency Management Plan: Fritz Mueller has informed us that he is in a “transition mode” this year, trying to get a little more time to spend with his family. This means that we need to find someone to fill in for him in overseeing the Emergency Plan. Fritz has agreed to work with us through the summer so finding a replacement now gives us the opportunity to learn from him. If you are interested in assuming this very important position please call the office.

Fritz has spent an inordinate amount of volunteer time helping to generate the Comprehensive Plan and developing the Emergency Plan. When you see him say “Thanks” he certainly deserves it for his dedicated efforts.

Household Hazardous Waste: On Saturday, August 7th, we will again participate with area communities in the Household Hazardous Waste disposal day. If you have household hazardous waste that you would like to dispose of, it must be brought to the Transfer Station **before 4:00 PM on Wednesday August 4th.**

Police Activity: Well, the series of quiet weekends passed. Vandals again struck Frye Island. This time approximately a dozen homeowners signs were stolen, a stop sign at one of our busy intersections was knocked down and a tree on beach #9 was set on fire.

I believe it was in Florida a couple of years ago where vandals removed a stop sign and an unsuspecting motorist went through the intersection where the stop sign had been removed, was hit by another vehicle and was killed. In this particular case no one was physically injured, we have a suspect and the signs have been recovered. We believe we have very strong evidence and have a meeting set for next week with the District Attorney to prosecute this to the fullest extent of the law. Because the stolen signs have a value in excess of \$2000.00, this case is considered a felony.

If you've been away for a few weeks and had a homeowners sign, make sure you still do.



VIC RICHARDS MEMORIAL PLANNED



Victor F.W. Richards, 1948-2004 "Vic"

Born to Dr. Victor and Jeanette Richards on January 12th, 1948 in San Francisco, CA, Vic was the 3rd of four children, their eldest.. and most remarkable son.

Vic graduated from Williams College in Williamstown, Massachusetts after emersion in college life of the sixties and deep introspection. He went on to travel in Europe and the United States before he found a home in the Sierra Nevada Mountains of California. Vic joined the California Forestry Service where he became a High Sierra's fire fighter leading his own troop of Hot Shot fire fighters for many years.

After meeting Janet on the ski slopes of Squaw Valley, he followed her back to New England where he pursued his graduate degree in National Resource Management at UNH and began their lives together as man and wife.

Vic enjoyed creative writing and poetry and spent his leisure hours running, skiing with his family, bird watching, scuba diving, landscaping, reading, appreciating country music and amusing us all with his keen observations of human behavior.

He will forever live on in the hearts of his wife Janet, and his daughters Emily and Molly and the friends and family whose lives he touched.

By now you have probably heard that Vic Richards, former long-time Manager of Frye Island, died last week in New Hampshire after suffering a heart attack about a month ago.

We Frye Islanders have great affection for Vic; the Frye Island we now enjoy is a result of his steady hand, dedication, and vision -- and it is in this spirit that a memorial is being planned in his honor. Plans are underway to acquire a granite bench, which will be placed in "Vic's Garden" on the right-hand side of the ferry landing -- a spot that Vic planned, purchased, and planted while he was our Town Manager. This seems an appropriate site, as Vic's wife Janet, has reminisced how much Vic enjoyed being near the lake and loved the view from his office window.

Contributions are now being accepted for his memorial at the Town Office. It is our hope to quickly acquire the necessary funds, place the order this fall. A formal dedication of Vic's bench is planned for Memorial Day weekend of 2005.


