Island Manager Comments

Greetings: A number of questions were raised about the Ferry Service at the recent Town Meeting. To help address some of these issues, I held a meeting this past Wednesday. In attendance were 4 members of the ferry crews and 5 other municipal officials. A number of areas were discussed as we “brainstormed” the operation and possible solutions to improve the operation. It was suggested that we better communicate the current operating policies of the Ferry Service to all Islanders, so this is my attempt to do that. I hope I can do it without making things more confusing.



When preparing the annual operating schedule, we develop a proposal based on operating data we receive from the ferry reports. This is then submitted to the Executive Committee for review and approval. The Charter identifies the Board of Island Trustees as the body that establishes the ferry fees and the Executive Committee as the body that establishes ferry operating policies. Our schedule is divided into three basic time periods (the pre-season - roughly May and June, the high season - July and August; and the post season – September and October). During the high season, the first ferry run on Monday morning is scheduled to **leave the Island** at 6:00 AM. This is to accommodate those Islanders that wish to spend Sunday night on the Island and still be able to travel to work on Monday morning. The rest of the week, Tuesday through Sunday, the first ferry run of the day is scheduled to **leave the Mainland** at 7:00 AM. That first ferry run each morning is prioritized for Island employees first, then residents, then all others. After that first scheduled ferry run, loading is on a first come first served basis. The last scheduled run of the day varies from day to day and is as follows: Sunday, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday 10:00PM, Thursday 11PM; Friday 12 Midnight, and Saturday 11PM.

With one ferry in operation, the ferry will leave the **Mainland** on the hour and on the half hour and the Island as soon as they are able to unload and reload. In order to maintain this schedule, the Captains will begin loading 3-5 minutes early. To be sure that you make your desired run please be at the ferry terminal at least 5 minutes before the scheduled departure. The Captains base their loading pattern on the vehicles that are in line when they begin the loading process.

Each ferry is designed with the bow angled from bow to stern which makes them more efficient when underway; but, because of this angle, there is a minimum amount of buoyancy at the bow to support heavy loads. Because of this, the ferries have to be loaded with the heavier loads in the stern in order to keep the propellers in the water and maximize maneuverability. On the mainland, when the ferry is in the slip, the bow of the ferry is closest to shore. On the Island, it is just the opposite. The stern is closest to shore. In addition, unbalanced loads on the port and starboard sides could cause the ferry to become unstable and very difficult to maneuver.

Prior to commencing the loading process the Captain will evaluate the vehicles that are in line. This will dictate how the Captain will load the ferries. Once the loading pattern has been established and the loading process has begun it may be very difficult to change. This is why vehicles that show up at the last second may not get loaded. So please, please, please, get to the ferry terminal at least 5 minutes early to avoid this potential problem.

During the high season, the second ferry is scheduled to run from 7:15AM until 11:45AM and from 2:15PM until 6:15 PM Monday through Thursday; from 7:15AM until 11:45AM and 2:15PM until 10:45PM Fridays; from 9:45AM until 10:15PM Saturday and from 10:15AM until 10:15PM on Sundays. When there are 2 ferries in operation they are scheduled to leave the Island and the Mainland on the quarter hour. However, the same rules apply. Be there 5 minutes early. When the traffic for the ferries is extremely heavy the Captains will shuttle. This means that they will continue to load and go as often as is necessary without regard to the schedule and will return to the schedule when traffic allows.

There was some discussion at both the Town Meeting and at our meeting on Wednesday about a perceived policy to load the ferries with only 6 vehicles. This concept developed last year after a recommendation from a safety review of the ferries by Associated Marine Surveyors, Inc. which included an inspection of the gear, equipment, and the operation. Subsequent discussions with Captain Theriault, who performed the inspection, indicated that the size and configuration of the cars, trucks and trailers will dictate the number of the vehicles that should be loaded. It is the ferry Captains charge to load and operate the ferries with as many vehicles on board as they can while operating as efficiently and as safely as possible.

We have received some recommended additions to the ferry schedule and these must be reviewed by the Executive Committee to determine their impact on the operation and the budget.

This may not answer all of the questions that you have but hopefully it will help a little. As we develop other ideas, I will present them for your consideration, in the meantime, I welcome your feedback as well as your ideas and input.

Fire Works: We received \$5445.60 in donations toward the fire works which is a little short of our goal of \$5500.00. However, I understand that there is still money from the car wash to come in. If we exceed the \$5500.00, any excess will be carried over for next year. I offer my thanks to all who contributed their time and dollars to make this another successful fire works display.



OPEN BURNING LAW

The State of Maine requires a permit for all open burning.

In the more rural areas of Northern Maine permits may be obtained at the local Maine Forest Ranger Headquarters or at the ranger's residence. In areas of Maine that are not so rural, permits are obtained at the residence of the fire warden or at the municipal facility.

Here on Frye Island, permits are obtained at the Fire Warden or Assistant Fire Warden's residence.

Nothing shall prohibit a municipality from adopting ordinances specifying stricter criteria than the State's open burning laws for out-of-door fires.

THERE IS NO OPEN BURNING PERMITTED ON FRYE ISLAND.

Only permits for warming or cooking are issued provided that an adequate weather advisory has been dispatched to us from the state and that additional guidelines are met.

There are no other types of open burning allowed, including campfires or bonfires either on private or public property.

The state issues what is referred to as a Class Day on a daily basis. Class Days are assigned by number depending on the moisture in the fuels on the ground, the amount of moisture we have received, wind conditions, and general weather conditions.

Class Days are grouped into five (5) categories.

Class 1 is when there is very little potential danger.

Class 2 is when there is some danger.

Class 3 is when there is danger present.

Class 4 is when there is moderate danger.

Class 5 is when there is extreme danger of fire threat.

The issuing of any permit or permission for allowable burning depends on the following criteria:

Forest fire danger (Class Day)

Time of day and season of the year

Temperature, humidity, wind speed and direction

Type of burning proposed

The length of burning period

The presence or availability of sufficient force and equipment to control the burning

Experience and capability of the permittee in the safe use and control of the burning

If a permit is issued, the burning must be conducted according to the terms and conditions of the permit and may not create a nuisance.

Any person who engages in out-of-door burning in violation of this article, or who fails to comply with any stated permit condition or restriction commits a Class E crime. In addition, if the State proves that while in violation that person's out-of-door fire resulted in fire suppression costs to municipal or State Government, the court, as part of any sentence imposed, may order restitution to be paid to the government entities incurring the suppression costs.

When bringing an action under this article, the State shall, to the fullest extent permitted by law, seek restitution of fire suppression costs incurred by state government entities relating to the violation.

Please remember that if you are issued a permit, you are responsible for the fire and the proper extinguishment of the fire when you are done. Do not leave a fire unattended or let the fire burn itself out.

MEMORIAL GARDEN

A number of Frye Island residents have expressed an interest in establishing some form of a cemetery on Frye Island. Last fall a committee was formed to look into the possibility of this. The committee members are: Mimi and John Nun, Rick Pertel, Don Nolan, Steve Kaplan, John Crosby, Grace Morin, Cappy Capobianco and Nancy Fournier.

This Committee researched different choices for Memorial Gardens as well as a site to put one on. It was unanimously decided that a Columbarium Memorial Garden would be the best choice as it would require minimum amount of space and minimum amount of investment. A columbarium is a granite monument with "niches" built into it. Each niche holds two urns and the outside of the niche would have a memorialized facing. The cost for one niche would be approximately \$1,500.00 (\$750.00 per urn). The columbarium monument would look something like this picture:



We also looked at several sites for the Memorial Garden and chose the old tennis court site at Recreation Beach. This site already has a chain link fence around it that is in remarkably good shape, it would be relatively easy to clear out, and it has a beautiful view of the lake.

Watercraft may not be operated at a speed greater than headway speed while within the water safety zone or within a marina or an approved anchorage in coastal or inland waters except while actively fishing. **“Headway speed”** means the minimum speed necessary to maintain steerage and control of the watercraft while the watercraft is moving. The operator of any watercraft must operate at a reasonable and prudent speed for existing conditions and regulate the speed of a watercraft so as to avoid danger, injury or unnecessary inconvenience in any manner to other watercraft and their occupants, whether anchored or under way. The operator must consider the effect of the wash or wave created by their watercraft to waterfront piers, floats or other property or shorelines.

BOAT BUILDING AND RACING

Six remarkable Frye Island families pooled their abilities of planning, construction, painting, decorating, racing and working together as a family - and came up with - six FANTASTIC boats - and races full of fun for them and for the many spectators at Recreation Beach Sunday July 3rd!!

Boat # 10, the Bruegger family 's, was cited for their imagination in planning and building their boat. They called it a Hawaiian outrigger (their grandmother and grandfather were born in Hawaii). They say, "Our Grandfather, John Bruegger, was the best helper on their team". Six of the Bruegger clan plus best friend Craig Dean worked on this boat.

Boat # 20, the Cuoco family boat, received the award for the most fun. Mother, father and Julia and Isabella Cuoco made up this team. Their slender Hawaiian boat was beautifully decorated with painted flowers and Hawaiian - like decorations.

Boat # 30, the Kane family boat, looked like the sister ship of # 20. In fact, the two families had considered connecting their two boats. It, too, was a colorful boat to see as they rowed their way to the finish line in the races. And who cares if you tip over and get a little wet. They picked themselves right up and continued on. Mom and Dad, 8 year old Rachel and 9 year old Patrick were the team members.

Boat # 40, the McOsker family's boat, had 9 members to build and race their boat! 9, that is! And the judges thought the award for cooperative construction should be their award. These are some of the comments from the crew: the hardest things they had to do were to build the boat in 1 1/2 days; put on the sides of the boat; fight the mosquitoes; keep going and make it float! The most fun was painting it and singing to Eli's guitar playing after it was finished. What inspired them to build the boat was that it looked like a real boat they had seen in the "The Perfect Storm". What they liked about their boat was the "spectacular drainage system and the last minute idea of the crew chewing gum and filling the holes." They call the boat a "dingy thingy".

Boat # 50, the Savage family boat, was another 9 member team collaboration, and earned the award of most original. It was a low flat boat which they call a "57 Chevy". Besides having lightning strike some of their working tools, they had 8 men aged 6 to 43 and 1 woman!!!! "Uncle Tod" says the most fun was making the guys build it. They built the boat in 24 hours and were especially pleased to see that it floats! The team names Capt. Mark as the best helper.

Boat # 60, the Torra family's boat, had a two person building team, father Tony and son Joe, 13. This is what Joe says about their boat: "During the construction, many things occurred. I think that the hardest part of the construction was to make the bow of the boat curve. We built the boat because my Dad and I wanted to build something together. The most fun I had in the construction was painting it. I like the colors that we used to make it because they resemble my town's colors (red, white, black). I would call this boat a dingy. My Dad was the most help, because he is a contractor. He and I spent 8 hours on our boat. That Torra boat was so well built and had such good oarsmen that it won the first 3 races for speed and was awarded the 1st place trophy. 2nd place trophy went to the Savage team for their finish of 44 seconds in the maneuverability race around the marker and back to the starting point. The Kane children, 8 year old Rachel and 9 year old Patrick, won the 3rd trophy for the youngest children in the speed races.

Congratulations to these 3 teams for their awards. We especially appreciate the contribution of the two lumber companies who supplied the construction materials for the boats - Red Mill Lumber and Hancock Lumber. They have been sponsors of this family project for the past three years. Thanks also to Bob LaDow who photographed and provided the teams with pictures. Thanks to Kathy Kane for providing the trophies and medals for all of the children participating. Thanks to the spectators who cheered on the racers. And thanks to Al Schmidt, John Schutz and Dave Lowe for setting up and judging. And a special vote of appreciation for RuthAnn Bourque who worked on the organization, setting up for the races and doing the announcing for the races.

CONSERVATION - WHO CARES?

Why are we here on Frye Island? There must be some very good reasons why we have homes on a piece of land with only part-time accessibility by ferry. The gorgeous Lake is not the only reason. The environment and the resulting “feeling” that we experience undoubtedly play a significant role. If this is true, then we should all care about keeping it the way that it is, in spite of the continuous development stresses. The natural beauty of the Island is the result of the forests and the tree canopy, plus the variety of the terrain i.e. beaches, wetlands, lagoons, swamps, vernal pools, large blocks of conservation areas with high value habitat and undeveloped Frye Island Inc. owned lots. Also, the abundant plant growth and frequent bird and other wildlife sightings add to the enjoyment. For example, on a recent short guided trail walk the group saw deer, grouse, rabbit and fox.

PROTECTING OUR ISLAND ENVIRONMENT IS CRITICAL

When human actions alter, or diminish our natural surroundings, they often damage or destroy habitat. Habitat is the place where a plant or animal lives, it includes everything they need to survive and reproduce. A few examples on Frye Island are deer in the “back nine” of the golf course and the numerous birds in the cove near Quail Circle and at the end of the causeway behind Long Beach.

How can you help? You can help by avoiding straight paths to the Lake and minimizing the time bare soil is exposed to rain run-off during, and after, construction or landscaping. Also, by planting shrubs and trees between your property and any water to create a buffer that will filter out pollutants that are the result of erosion. You can “adopt” one, or more, roads, trails or beaches by picking up leaves, brush or trash. Most of us have chosen to come to Frye Island because of the rich environment and landscape of trees, lake, beaches and plant and animal life. So, let’s keep it that way.

We all should care and act accordingly.
