# Town News

## Island Manager's Comments

Greetings Everyone,

Again, I would like to welcome the recent arrivals back to Frye Island for what we hope will be another very enjoyable season for all. Mother Nature has been very fickle lately with the tremendous storms that delayed the Island opening, the warm, sunny, breezy days that followed, and helped dry the Island out and now back to the rainy, cold days. But, the crews have done a great job staying on top of everything in an effort to provide everyone a great season.

Many of the articles in this issue are repeats from last week for the benefit of the new arrivals, but there is new information as well.

**Long Beach Marina & Quail Circle Canal:** The docks at the Long Beach Marina have been installed. Last fall we reviewed this area with Great Northern Dock's and determined that we could shorten some of the shore anchors in order to pull the docks in closer to shore and increase the travel area. This was accomplished this spring. However, this is a "No Wake Zone", so as you leave and return to the marina please drive with care and caution. Both Long Beach Marina and Quail Circle are full and we have waiting lists for both sites. So, if you do not plan to renew your rental slip, please call the office so that we can reassign your slip to someone on the waiting list. The fees for 2007 are as follows:

- Marina Equity Slips \$225.00
- Marina Rental \$900.00
- Quail Circle \$200.00

**DON'T FORGET:** Your Yacht Club fees must be paid by the time the office closes on Thursday, May 31st or you could lose your spot.

If you are installing a dock at Quail Circle, please make sure you install it correctly so that it doesn't infringe upon your neighbors space. The center of the dock should be located at the numbered pipe. In addition, it has been brought to my attention that some people at Quail do not secure the outboard (the end in the water) of the dock and wave action and wind can cause the dock to swing into their neighbor's space. So, in addition to getting the dock in the right location, please consider this swinging potential when installing your docks.

### **DO NOT FORGET YOUR MILFOIL STICKER**

It is each boater's responsibility to get a yearly Milfoil sticker. Please get that sticker and put it on your boat. The cost of these stickers supports the program to keep Milfoil out of our beautiful lake.

**Frye Island vs. the State of Maine:** There has been no change in our law suit vs. the State of Maine. Our suit challenges the constitutionality of the legislative action that denies the Town of Frye Island the opportunity to withdraw from a school district; a right that all other communities in Maine have as defined by the State Constitution. In addition, we challenged the exemption applied by legislative action that prevents the Town of Frye Island from using the student population as part of the formula for determining the amount of taxes to be paid to support education. The Town has stated on many occasions that it is not the intention of this law suit to NOT pay toward the education of Maine students, but only to be treated as all other communities in the State are.

One thing that may affect the decision, or at least the timing of the decision, is the Governor's proposal to establish "super districts" in the State based on the 26 statewide districts presently configured for the vocational schools. Our SAD 6 Representative, Oleg Svetlichny, will explain this in more detail later in this issue. If this is enacted however, it is unsure how it will impact Frye Island and what effect it might have on the law suit.

**Public Hearings:** There will be a public hearing to discuss the SAD #6 budget on Saturday May 26<sup>th</sup> at 11:00 AM at the Community Center. This is your chance to hear the presentation by school representatives and to ask any questions that you may have regarding the budget.

**MSAD #6 Referendums:** MSAD #6 will be conducting two (2) separate referendum votes. The first will be held May 22<sup>nd</sup> and the second will be June 12<sup>th</sup>. The first requests authorization for bonds for the construction of a new K through 5 school in Buxton. The second is for approval of the "FY 07-08" budget. A public hearing for the first referendum was held Monday May 7<sup>th</sup>. A public hearing for the budget will be held at the Frye Island Community Center on Saturday May 26<sup>th</sup> at 11:00 AM. Sample ballots for both referenda are posted on the Town bulletin board, at the office and on the web site.

Maine Election Law permits any **registered voter** to cast an absentee ballot. If you are a registered voter in Frye Island you may request an absentee ballot by completing the application on the web site or by calling the office at 207-655-4551 during normal business hours. Polls for the May 22<sup>nd</sup> election will open at 10:00 AM at the Community Center and close at 8:00 PM. The polls for the June 12<sup>th</sup> referendum will also open at 10:00

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AM at the Community Center and close at 8:00PM. All ballots, including the absentee ballots, will be counted after the polls close. If you have any questions regarding either election please call the office.

**LD 1838:** Legislation entitled “An Act to Ensure Safety on Freshwater Ferry Vessels” has been proposed in the Maine legislature. It is currently in the committee phase of review. A public hearing was held last week that we attended and offered testimony. As we stated at the hearing, we certainly are not opposed to any legislation that would help ensure the safety of our operation and our residents. While we already comply with most of the legislation as proposed there are some wording changes that would better apply to our operation. The proposed legislation lumps our ferries with the Songo River Queen and the Katahdin, which is similar to the “Queen” and operates on Moosehead Lake. The differences between these operations and ours are quite obvious which makes some of this “broad brush” approach difficult. We met with Representative John Robinson, one of the co-sponsors of the bill, following the hearing and discussed some of our concerns. We offered to provide written constructive comments on the bill which he said he would appreciate. He also said that he would notify us when the next work session is scheduled. This legislation was prompted by the tragic capsizing of a tour boat in New York last year. Have no fear however, we had stability tests performed on our ferries last year and they are extremely stable.

**Board of Appeals:** I am sorry to report that Harry Molloy has resigned from the Board of Appeals. I want to thank him for his service and wish him the best. Harry’s resignation leaves a vacancy on the Board, so if any one is interest in volunteering for this position, please call the office at 655-4551.

**Dogs:** We have had complaints of dogs running loose on the island. Please be considerate of your fellow islanders and keep your pets leashed. If this continues, we will be forces to contact the Animal Control Officer.

I know that it may seem a bit early to be talking about the beaches, but this applies to the public beaches as well. It is very annoying to be sitting on a beach enjoying a great day with family and friends while having to put up with dogs running around in the water and on the beach. I am sure a little consideration for your fellow Islanders would be greatly appreciated.

Along those same lines, a number of large owls, hawks, fisher cats and fox have been spotted on the Island. If you let small animals including cats and dogs loose they may become victims. I am told that every year a number of cats are lost to the wild.

**Meetings:** The next regularly scheduled meeting of the Board of Selectman / Executive Committee is scheduled for Saturday May 26<sup>th</sup> at 9:00 AM in the Community Center. This meeting is open to the public.

**Public Safety:** In addition to the “Breaking and Entering” and burglary reported last weekend, we also had two other property owners report attempted break-ins. There were also a number of vehicles vandalized at the ferry landing on the mainland last week-end. This happened after the ferry operation had secured for the night. All of these issues are being investigated by the Frye Island police and by Cumberland County.

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## **State Budget, Consolidation of Schools, and MSAD #6**

Greetings,

### The twist and turns of the ways of doing work in Augusta.

The Governor's budget proposal is LD 499. It has problems. If you care about details, please visit the state website [www.maine.gov](http://www.maine.gov). If not, please read on. LD499 may affect Frye Island in a major, at this time unpredictable, way.

One problem with the LD 499 is its provision to consolidate schools. A year or so ago, Brookings Institute submitted a report on their study of the cost of education in Maine. One recommendation was to decrease the number of school units in order to save on the administration costs -- there are too many small schools in Maine. Brookings' experts felt that a school unit with about 4,000 students would be a desirable size. Thus, Bonny Eagle could be a model. That is not how our Governor thought and acted.

The Governor's proposal would create 26 Regional School Units, or RSUs. (Please welcome a new acronym!) The number 26 was chosen because Maine has that many vocational education regions. The boundaries of these regions were drawn a long time ago. If the Governor's proposal would pass, SAD6 would be merged with the Gorham, Scarborough, Windham, and Westbrook schools. Frye Island would be a small fish in a Grand Big Pond indeed! There was a wave of opposition to this proposal. Several competing proposals were soon generated. The Appropriation Committee designed one of them. It calls for creation of 80 Regional School Units. The Commissioner of Education would draw the boundaries of all RSUs. This is a lot of power given to one person, taking into the account that the municipalities would have only 60 days to come up with an alternative configuration. (Where would the Commissioner put the Frye Island?) No RSU would have fewer than 2,000 students. In many other aspects, this proposal follows the Governor's proposal. To wit: All MSADs, School Unions, and other current school configurations would be abolished. Current school boards/school committees would be dissolved. New RSU school boards would have fifteen directors. How elections would be structured remains an interesting question. However, local control of education would become history. All school assets would be transferred to these new RSUs. However, the liabilities would remain with the municipalities. All of these changes would be mandated on an accelerated schedule. There is no resolution yet to the school consolidation battle in Augusta. As a result, there is still no state budget!

### "Fixing" the Essential Programs and Services (EPS).

Because of school consolidation proposals, MSAD #6 (as well as all other school units in Maine) does not know exactly the size of its state aid under the EPS school funding paradigm. In addition, legislators and the Governor are busy *fixing* (perhaps, a better word would be *fiddling* with) the EPS to balance the budget, trying to shift more and more of the burden to the local tax dollars. For example, the Appropriation Committee's proposal would mandate across-the-board 5% cuts in the transportation, special education, and facility maintenance budgets regardless of the local conditions. But, the core premise of EPS was to take into account the local conditions! Mandating across-the-board 5% cuts is a sure way of renegeing on the promise of funding 55% of the EPS costs. To comply with this mandate would be very difficult. For example, no one can cut 5% from the special education budget without cutting services. Cutting these services would result in legal actions. Special education is guaranteed under the Federal law --I.D.E.A. An additional *fixing* of the EPS is that beyond 2007-2008, there might be zero aid from the state for student activities. One can be sure that Augusta will find a few more creative ways of diluting the EPS.

### MSAD # 6 Budget for 2007-2008 School Year

MSAD #6 did very well under the EPS funding formula in the past two years. The size of future aid is, for the reasons discussed above, uncertain. However, despite all the EPS *fixing* activities and the uncertainties about the school consolidation, the fact remains that children must be educated. This is a part of the Maine Constitution. The Bonny Eagle School Board and Administration recognize this truth and our obligation to act in the best interest of the children. The 2007-2008 budget that residents of Frye Island have the right (and civic duty) to vote on June 12 is an austere budget. First, it is a needs-based budget. That is, there are no hidden dollars. Obviously, not all needs could be included. The Board and Administration made many difficult tradeoffs to come up with a budget that would continue improving the educational programs to our 4,000 students, and, at the same time, hold down the inevitable increases. Second, this budget was already once reduced by the School Board in light of the uncertainties in Augusta. Please take the opportunity to read the ***Bonny Eagle School District 2007-2008 Budget*** handout available in our Town Office. (Note that there is one unfortunate typographical error. In the central foldout, on the bottom one should read Total 2007-2008 Budget rather than Total 2006-2007 Budget.) On page 6 of the handout, you will see how the local costs are allocated to the five towns. Neither School Board nor the Administration has anything to do with this formula. It is prescribed by the State. It is based on the State's assessment of towns (they refer to it as *valuation*) after tracking sales, new

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constructions, and other parameters. A town's share is in the same proportion to the total local cost as the percentage of its valuation to the total district valuation. For Frye Island, it is 5.06%. These percentages change each year, sometimes by very surprising amounts. Frye Island, having so many water front properties, is getting, according to the state valuations, significantly wealthier each year!

Thank you for getting informed and for your participation in the referendum.

It is all about educating kids!

## ***Bonny Eagle New Elementary School in Buxton***

Greetings,

This time, I am pleased to report on a positive development.

The last time the District constructed a new elementary school was in 1981. (A quarter of a century ago!) The District now has an opportunity to have a new state-funded elementary school in Buxton. On April 11, the State Board of Education approved the conceptual design for this new school that is sized to accommodate 850 children -- kindergarten through grade 5. This new school will replace four existing schools. The District worked very hard for a long time to get to this point. Now, the fate of this construction is in the hands of the District's voters.

On 22 May 2007, there will be a district-wide referendum on this new school. There are two parts to the referendum. The first one is asking the voters to approve state-funded portion of this construction, which is \$26,580,507 dollars. To be eligible to receive this amount, the District must locally raise \$130,510 for the purchase of land (which already has been arranged) and the oversight of the construction. Because, state rules do not provide sufficient funds for a full sized gymnasium, the District is seeking approval of additional local funds of \$1,368,624. Copies of pamphlet showing the conceptual design of this new school are available in the Town Office. Please take one, as well as a copy of the District's publication *Focus on Six*, which is like our FINS. You will find many interesting snapshots there showing what kids are doing in various schools.

In conclusion, I would like to say that Bonny Eagle was fortunate to be second on the list of more than 200 competing projects. If the referendum fails, then Bonny Eagle will fall behind other competing projects -- perhaps never to recover. In that case, the solution to the classroom space would be paid 100% with the local dollars.


## Fire Department Notice

### POWER LINES ARE DANGEROUS

One of the calls that the Frye Island Fire Department responded to, was a tree fire on a power line. When FIFD arrived on the scene an individual visiting on the Island had pushed the tree off the power line. He stated he felt some tingling in his body when he pushed the tree. This was a very dangerous move on his part, as the tree was touching the top or primary line that is carrying 12,000 volts. He was a very lucky person that night - if the tree, his hands or shoes were wet it probably would have been instant death. If you see a tree on a power line DO NOT GO NEAR IT as there is potential for electrocution. Like Central Maine Power states in their TV ads, NO LINE IS SAFE EVER.

## During Power Outages

- Use flashlights or battery generated lights
- Avoid carrying a lighted candle
- Don't use a candle when looking for items in a closet
- Never use a candle for light near a kerosene heater or lantern
- Extinguish all candles when leaving the home or when going to sleep
