# Town News

## Island Manager's Comments

### Greetings Everyone:

**Water Distribution System:** We continue to work on the installation of the water distribution line on Independence Way. As of this morning we were at the intersection of Independence and Middle Beach Road. The digging has been easier since we got past the ledges in the transfer station area. We will suspend the installation for the weekend but I urge you to be very cautious when traveling in the work zone. There could be some soft areas where the crews have been digging.

**Long Beach Marina & Quail Circle Canal:** The time to renew your slip rental at both Long Beach Marina and Quail Circle has come and gone. We will begin reassigning the slips that are available this week.

**Boat Registrations:** If you have a Maine boat that you need to re-register I would urge you to use the service provided by the Inland Fisheries and Wildlife Department. I recently re-registered my boat from my home computer and it only took me about 5 minutes. I was really impressed with the service. I printed a temporary registration and within a few days I had my permanent registration and the appropriate stickers. You can access this service from a link on our web-site.

**Taxes:** I realize that it is a bit early but I want to remind everyone that the second half of the 2009 property tax is due June 30<sup>th</sup>. Interest will start to accrue on July 1<sup>st</sup> for all unpaid taxes.

**Board Meeting:** The next scheduled meeting of the Board of Selectmen / Executive Committee will be held on Saturday June 27<sup>th</sup>. The meeting will be held at the Community Center and will begin at 9 AM. All are welcome to attend.

**Ferry Ticketing:** We have received two proposals to provide an electronic ticketing / data collection system for the ferries. Both of the proposals will be reviewed by the committee this weekend with the goal of selecting a vendor. The plan is to have the software developed this summer so that it can be tested during September and October, reworked as necessary through the winter, and implemented next spring. I will keep you abreast of our progress.

**Ferry Revenue:** The total revenue from the sale of ferry tickets continues to run a little ahead of last year at this time. Through May 31, 2008 we had total revenues of \$75,376. Through May 31 of this year we have total revenues of \$83,277. While this appears to be a positive trend, it is difficult to know how many people let their ticket supply dwindle down at the end of last season and are just stocking up now. I will continue to watch this closely. In addition, operating expenses are more favorable than last year. At this point last year we had expended 30.32% of our budget compared to 24.27% this year. Hopefully these trends will continue.

**Tickets:** There are still old \$5, \$7 and \$10 tickets out there that people are using. After June 1<sup>st</sup> we will no longer accept these tickets at the ferry trailer. We just don't have the resources to deal with all of these different tickets. If you have any of these tickets left, you can bring them to the office and we will credit the value of the ticket towards the purchase of the \$15.00 ticket. We really appreciate your cooperation in this matter.

**Sunday Storm:** If you were on the Island last Sunday evening, you were witness to some wild weather. The wind whipped the lake into 4 and 5 foot waves that made the trip on and off the Island a truly exciting experience. My hat is off to Captain Buddy Collins and Lynn Gagnon, the Mate, for their skill and efforts to keep the ferry operating on schedule during those miserable conditions.

Unfortunately, a number of Islanders had docks damaged or destroyed during this storm. I didn't hear of any boats lost but there were 8 or 9 docks. On Monday, we had Del Wescott from Dock World come out to rescue / retrieve what they could of the damaged docks. Dave Bond, Commodore of the Yacht Club, was instrumental in getting this accomplished. He was also one of the unfortunate Islanders that lost his dock. However, this is not a problem unique to Frye Island. A number of people all over the lake were victims to the rough weather prompting Sam Merriam, from Great Northern Docks to prepare the dock installation tips that have been attached to this edition of the FINS.

## **Safe Boating Tips**

- Trash bags( kitchen size) and gallon size zip lock bags come in handy while boating for numerous uses( especially for securing trash ). Please encourage your boating passengers to use them and secure them while underway. A trash bag sucked onto a boat's outdrive, could prove fatal to the engine that picks it up.
- Turn-off all electrical equipment when docking your watercraft after a days activities. When accidentally left in the "on" position, they could drain your battery. "Lock" your battery switch in the off position to avoid theft and as another way in which to save your battery life.
- Secure your watercraft covers tightly and with "pitch" to allow for rapid water run-off. This will prevent sagging and pooling of water and leaves, etc.; the primary cause for canvas wear and tears.
- Ensure dock bumpers/fenders are securely fastened to your watercraft and are strategically placed, so as to avoid damage to your watercraft. Dock lines should be of adequate size to safely secure your watercraft. They should be supple, free of unnecessary knots and fraying, and be in good usable condition. Dock lines need to be secure after dockage and be adequate in number. Dock lines should NOT run across docks, for safety reasons. Secure your dock lines before leaving your slip.

## **Protection Against Mosquitoes**

- Avoid places and times when mosquitoes bite. Generally, peak biting periods for the type of mosquitoes capable of transmitting WNV occur just before and after sunset and just before dawn.
- Apply insect repellent containing 25-35% DEET when you're outdoors.
- Assure door and window, patio and porch screens are tight-fitting and in good repair.
- Wear long-sleeved tops, long pants, socks and shoes and clothing made of tightly woven materials to keep mosquitoes away from skin. Light colored clothing is best.
- Eliminate stagnant water in bird baths, ponds, flower pots/trays/saucers, water fountains and water features and get rid of tires, buckets or other receptacles that could serve to contain water where mosquitoes might breed.
- Be sure to check clogged gutters and flat roofs that may have poor drainage.
- Make sure cisterns, cesspools, septic tanks, rain barrels and trash containers are covered tightly with a lid or with 16-mesh screen.
- Level the ground around residence so water can run off and not collect in low spots. Fill in holes or depressions near the building that accumulate water.
- Fill in tree rot holes and hollow stumps that hold water.
- Stock ornamental water gardens with fish (e.g. minnows, "mosquito fish" or goldfish) that eat mosquito larvae.
- Treat small pools of water with "Bti", a bacterial insecticide. Many hardware stores carry doughnut-shaped Bti briquettes (Mosquito Dunks) for this purpose. Be sure to follow the insecticide label exactly.
- Keep weeds and grass cut short; adult mosquitoes look for these shady places to rest during the hot daylight hours.
- Bird and wild game hunters should follow the usual precautions when handling wild animals and birds. They should wear gloves when handling and cleaning birds or animals to prevent blood exposure to bare hands.

## ***Don't Feed the Ducks***

If you feed them, they will come.

If you have ever visited a lake or pond and seen [ducks](#), chances are you have seen people feed them.

Unfortunately this is not a good thing to do. You may think you are doing the ducks a favor by offering them bits of bread, potato chips or other types of food but you are not.

When you feed ducks you are likely giving them food that is not nutritious. While ducks seem to love bread, it is not that nutritious and generally just fills them up.

Feeding ducks also makes them dependent on hand-outs and makes them tame. Ducks are wild birds that should not rely on humans to feed them. They also need to learn how to get their own food.

When ducks become tame and use to humans they may not be able to protect themselves from predators.

Another reason not to feed ducks is because of the waste that is left behind. Duck droppings can contain bacteria that is not healthy for humans. Too much bacteria in the water and on the land where the ducks are attracted to can be detrimental to your health.

Don't forget, in many areas ducks are suppose to migrate to different areas at different times of the year. If you feed ducks you may be delaying their migration.

Ducks are cute little critters that are fun to watch and great to photograph. Most ducks can fend for themselves. If there are ducks in a pond or lake near you that have always seemed to be there chances are someone is taking care of them if they can't take care of themselves.



## **DOCK DAMAGE PREVENTION TIPS FOR WILD WINDS AND WAVES**

For 30 years now my company has been designing and building docks for the residents of Frye Island. If you happen to live where Sebago Lake's fury can render damage or destruction on docks, then these tips may be of help to you.

Floating docks other than swim rafts, are most vulnerable and are not a good choice in harsh environments. Swim rafts, typically an 8x8 or 10x10 platform should be moored with heavy chain, 5/16" or greater and should be inspected annually for wear. A swim raft can typically have buoyancy of 1200 pounds or more. Therefore, it could potentially drag an anchor that weighs 1200 pounds or less. I don't know anyone who moors a swim raft with that much weight. The appropriate length and weight of chain will prevent the swim raft from tugging directly on the anchor. Choosing the type of anchor and the amount of weight should be done with the assistance or advice from an experienced installer. Five-gallon pales of concrete tend to roll on the lake bottom and may not grab the sand, ledge or whatever is down there. Cinder block anchors chained together are usually not dense enough and can break apart when tumbling around the bottom. Remember that most concrete products will lose nearly half their weight when dropped to the bottom.

Most likely, if you already have a dock that is exposed to high winds, it is a stationary permanent or removable standing dock that may be on pipe legs, posts, roll-in docks or cribs. Most docks have permanently fastened decking, either nailed or screwed. When docks are set too low to the water, large waves during high winds can pound against the underside of the decking causing the dock system to heave. This continuous pounding can result in damage or complete destruction of the dock. When the dock is installed, its deck level should be just above the anticipated maximum wave height. A wave height is measured vertically from crest to trough and only half of its height is above the water level compared to when the lake is calm. For example, if the maximum wave height is 4 feet then the underside of the decking should be just over 2 feet above the calm water.

Through April and early May when spring runoff raises the water level above the summer norm, some residents desire their dock to be set low to the water knowing the lake will drop as the weeks pass. I think its best to put off the installation until later in May or June when the lake is most likely to be lower. When the lake gets too low for comfortable access into a boat, consider hiring the installer to return for a mid-season adjustment. After July 4<sup>th</sup>, many installers are available at an affordable rate per dock section.

An alternative deck choice known as Thru-flow has been available in recent years and has had some successes where docks were lower to the water than what is recommended above. The material is made of fiberglass reinforced polyethylene and is molded with 1/2" slotted holes throughout, reducing the solid surface area significantly. This allows pressure from the waves to pass through the material and less area for the wave to lift against. It is available in panels of 12"x36" and 12"x48", colors of beige and gray.
