Island Manager's Comments

Greetings everyone:

Lake Level: There has been no change with the status of SD Warren's permit application, and the revised Lake Level Management Plan. However, the Bureau of Environmental Protection has agreed to consider the request to reopen the Water Quality Certification process. The date has been changed to September 20th. I would urge everyone to view the Save Our Sebago website at, www.saveoursebago.com, for more information.

Save Our Sebago presentation: The Conservation Commission and the Garden Club are co-sponsoring a presentation from "Save Our Sebago" on Saturday evening August 4th at 7 PM. The presentation will be held at the Community Center. Charlie Frechette will be the guest speaker. Charlie has been involved in the effort to get a reasonable Lake Level Management Plan since the relicensing process began almost 9 years ago. I am sure the presentation will be very informative and Charlie will be able answer all the questions you might have. Coffee and dessert will be served.

EZ Ride Accounts: Apparently there has been a misunderstanding on some peoples part as to how to replenish their EZ Ride accounts. There are only 2 ways this can be done:

1. Automatic withdrawal from your bank account. If you selected this method to replenish your account when you applied for the account, the EZ Ride system will trigger an automatic withdrawal from your bank account and deposit it into your EZ Ride account when you get down to a preselected balance.
2. Manually add to your account. If you selected this method to replenish your account there are 2 ways this can be done:
 - a. You can come to the office with cash or a check and the clerk will deposit that payment into your account, or
 - b. You can mail a check to the office and the clerk will deposit the amount of the check into your account. Please include your Lot #.

That's it folks, there is no way that you can replenish your EZ Ride account by yourselves.

Milfoil: For a number of years we have been using a diver, certified to remove milfoil, in the areas where we have had infestations. Last week I asked for a few volunteers to assist the diver and I got three that would help depending on their availability. I appreciate their willingness to step up. In addition, I have had a

conversation with the Executive Director of the Raymond Waterways Protective Association (RWPA). They have a Diver Assisted Suction Harvester (DASH) which is used around the lake to harvest milfoil. This is, very basically, a pontoon boat rigged with a vacuum pump and dewatering chambers. It works like a large vacuum cleaner. The diver takes a large hose into the milfoil area, vacuums the milfoil and water into a dewatering chamber where the water drains back into the lake and the milfoil is captured. I asked about the availability of the DASH boat but unfortunately, many areas around the lake have the same need and also have requests in. For whatever the reason, milfoil is a problem in many areas this year. She, the Executive Director, is going to check into the availability of their boat and others that are in the area. In addition, she will get me some information on pads that can be used. At this time, I know absolutely nothing about the pads or how they work but as soon as I do I will share the information with you. In the mean time, please be very careful when boating in the marina and around the lake this year. Milfoil is spread very easily.

Community Center Tennis Courts: We are gaining. The fence has been installed and as soon as we can lock the gates Vermont Tennis Co. will paint the courts and the lines. If you have been up to the Community Center, you may have noticed that some nit-wit felt compelled to drive a golf cart on the newly paved surface. Fortunately it doesn't appear to be damaged; but we certainly wouldn't dare paint the courts before we can lock them up. We are still on schedule to have them open on the 28th.

Michael Murphy Day: I was privileged to meet some of the young men of the USS Michael Murphy recently and was extremely impressed. They were all very dedicated to our country, committed to their duty, and exceptionally proud of their ship and her namesake; Lt. Michael Murphy

Michael Patrick Murphy was a Navy SEAL from Long Island, New York who gave his life trying to save his SEAL team in Afghanistan in 2005. For his heroic effort, he was posthumously awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor.

A book, *SEAL of Honor*, documents the history of this action and offers a biography of Michael Murphy, an American hero. Another book *Lone Survivor*, by Marcus Luttrell, tells of the effort required to become a Navy SEAL, and very graphically tells of the firefight on Hindu Kush when Michael Murphy died. If you like reading of military history and heroic efforts, I would recommend them both.

On Saturday, July 28th Frye Island will provide a day of recreation for the men and women that will proudly serve on the USS Michael Murphy. Thanks to the efforts of Dick Norris, this will be the third Bath built ships crew we will have treated to a day on the Island. I urge everyone to get involved to make this a memorable day for these young men and women before they sail.

I would urge you to consider inviting a couple (more if you want) of the crew members to share dinner with you and your family that evening. It is an opportunity to meet some truly remarkable young men and women. If you haven't already volunteered, I would urge you to contact Dick Norris.

Willis Property: Many of you may know that in 2005, the Town purchased approximately 25 acres of land on the mainland, directly across the Raymond Cape Road from the ferry access road. At the time we had no specific plans for its use but it did provide the Town with options that didn't exist prior to its purchase. In addition, we formed a committee to study the whole transportation issue in 2005. After a very quick review it was obvious that the ferries and all of the associated equipment should be the first priority. The Committee did a great job and the report that was generated is on our web site. The first suggestion from the committee was to provide an area on the mainland for parking and for the queuing of vehicles to keep them off the Raymond Cape Road while waiting for the ferry. There are times throughout the season when the ferry service can't keep up with the demand and the lines waiting to board the ferry extend onto the Cape Road. This creates a serious safety issue, not only for Islanders waiting in line but also for residents in the Quarry Cove and Wild Acres areas. I am sure that no one reading this would ever exceed the speed limit trying to catch the ferry but it has been known to happen. With vehicles lined up on the Cape Road we have created an accident just waiting to happen. To help minimize this safety issue, we have submitted the design for a 50 vehicle parking / queuing area on the mainland to the Raymond Planning Board and to the DEP. Needless to say, the Raymond Planning Board had a number of questions and suggested that we do a traffic study to quantify the number of vehicles that could be parked and queued on or near the Cape Road waiting for the ferry. Here's where I could use your help. I know that at times, especially on holiday weekends, when there have been some relatively long lines waiting to access the ferry. I also know that 3 or 4 years ago, on a Thursday evening on the 4th of July weekend, the wait to get the ferry was 2 hours or longer. If you were one of the unlucky ones to be involved in that fiasco or have experienced a long wait for the ferry at other times please email me at wfournier@fryeisland.com and let me know. If you know that time you waited and the number of vehicles in line it would be extremely helpful. I will let you know of the progress on our applications.

Did you know that patios are structures?

Code Enforcement Officer: John Thompson

Recently it has come to our attention that there is some confusion relating to whether patios have to meet structure setbacks or are counted as floor area.

While we attempted to eliminate any confusion regarding patios with the 2006 amendments to the Guidelines for Municipal Shoreland Zoning Ordinances, it is clear that those changes didn't have the full effect we were anticipating.



Since 1973, the Guidelines definition of a structure has been worded in a manner to include patios, even back when patios were not explicitly included in that definition.

Some have suggested that the Department of Environmental Protection should define exactly what a patio is, since one person may call it a patio and the next person may call it a sitting area, for example.

In reality, what we call the item is irrelevant. The true litmus test is whether the object meets the definition of a structure.

The structure definition is fairly broad, but at the same time is rather clear: **“anything built for the support, shelter or enclosure of persons, animals, goods or property of any kind,...constructed or erected with a fixed location on or in the ground...”** This definition certainly includes patios and other similar structures.

When such a structure is non-conforming, it may be expanded under the non-conforming expansion provisions; this means that the structure has floor area.

To ensure proper municipal administration and enforcement of the shoreland zoning provisions, please be sure to apply the structure definition and other relevant structure standards to patios and similar structures.

Hopefully this article puts any confusion to rest.

Open Fires

Open fires in a screened enclosure designed for such use or a chimeneas are permitted with the following conditions:

It must be used only on an acceptable permit required burn day within the state. (A permit will not be necessary to use the device but it must be a day in which burning is allowed).

The device must be on sand or dirt in a wide open area to prevent any spread of fire. It must be placed away from any structure and CAN NOT be situated on a porch, deck or other similar area. It must be continuously monitored by an adult. A fire hose or bucket of water must be nearby. The fire department has the authority to extinguish any fire that constitutes a hazard.

A camp fire is not permitted or is any burning of slash, leaves, branches or tree trunks. A person using one of these devices accepts full responsibility for their action if a mishap occurs.

The Forest Service determines the class day every morning. They broadcast this information over the radio to notify all the fire departments. The Frye Island Fire Department gets this information over their portable radios. In addition, local fire departments, like Raymond, give out this information in their morning radio announcement. They give the class day and whether or not permits will be issued. If conditions are extremely dry or if there are high winds, there probably will be no permits issued. A call to the Raymond Fire Department dispatcher or asking one of our own members should give you the answer.

- Class Days are grouped into five (5) categories.
- Class 1 is when there is very little potential danger.
- Class 2 is when there is some danger.
- Class 3 is when there is danger present.
- Class 4 is when there is moderate danger.
- Class 5 is when there is extreme danger or fire threat.

A Note from a Frye Island Family

“Distracted Driving”

This weekend will mark the one year anniversary of our son being killed by a distracted driver in a head on collision. We are writing this letter because we want people to understand how tragic it can be when you operate a vehicle while using a cell phone.

Society needs to come to an understanding that a vehicle can quickly become a deadly weapon. Driving requires full attention at all times. It takes a split second to lose control and cause someone to lose their life. Our son lost his life because someone was distracted for a split second. There is nothing that important where one needs to use their cell phone while driving. If you must, please pull over and stop the vehicle. It could be a life or death decision.

There are reports of fatal accidents on the news every night. We always thought, “This couldn’t happen to our family”. It did and it can happen to someone in your family. To say it has devastated our family is an understatement.

The statistics are scary. In 2010 there were 900,000 distracted driving crashes, 417,000 injuries and 3,092 deaths nationwide. The National Transportation Safety Board has called for a nationwide ban on all portable electronic devices while operating a motor vehicle. Please contact your local lawmakers and encourage them to support these bills if your state doesn’t already have one in place.

We must inform our teens and young adults by talking to them about the realities of distracted driving. We must also set a good example, because it all starts at home.

Please help us stop this tragic epidemic and put the cell phones away while driving.

Alcohol and Kids

I want to take this time to address a very serious subject for me and I hope every parent of an island teenager. Often I hear that alcohol experimentation for a teenager as some sort of “rite of passage”, it’s normal, to be tolerated, what’s the worry, we’re on an island so what can happen? First of all, plenty can happen and not just on the island. This “rite of passage” attitude will follow your child home where they will change from golf carts and country dirt roads to full size vehicles and highways. I’m not trying to judge, we are all good parents of good kids, just trying to do the best we can. But as a parent myself, I have always considered my first responsibility as a parent was to keep my kids as safe as possible. Allowing kids to leave the house with alcohol, allowing your home to be used as a place for kids to consume alcohol is irresponsible and illegal.

Over my 33 years as a police officer I have had the unpleasant task of knocking on at least a dozen doors at 3:00 in the morning just to watch parents already worried face turn to horror, often before I speak a single word. A worried parent at 3 in the morning knows what I’m going to say, even before I say it. This “rite of passage” attitude, or the making believe you don’t know what’s going on when your child goes out the door at midnight can have devastating life changing effects for your entire family and community. We all want the same thing; we want your children to be safe. What seeds you plant on this island will grow elsewhere.

- Since there is no set delivery time, packages arrive (up to 6 different deliveries) throughout the day. They are stored at the Ferry landing, until they are moved to the Island Post Office for pick up by recipients.

- A non-paid Island volunteer transports the packages to Frye Island Post Office, and the packages are usually available for pick up by 6PM.
- If you are a renter expecting a package delivery, you will need to request a post office key from the town office the following day, during normal business hours, to pick up your package in the Island Post Office.

If you are expecting a time-sensitive delivery, and you have personally verified its arrival with the delivery company, you may travel across on the ferry as a pedestrian at no charge to pick up your delivery. DO NOT call the ferry landing for package delivery information. We handle thousands of packages each season, and cannot possibly manage to go searching for every individual's arrival.

It is very important to have current and accurate contact information regarding phone numbers and Email addresses in the Frye Island directory, in the event that you must be contacted regarding package delivery issues.

Safe Boating Tips

- Age Requirements-“When operating a motorboat with more than 10 horsepower, a person under the age of 12 must be under immediate supervision of a person located in the boat who is at least 16 years of age. A person under the age of 16 years may not operate personal watercraft, which includes jet skis.

A person between 16-18 years of age may operate a personal watercraft if they have successfully completed an approved education course, or if they are accompanied by a person 18 years of age or older. Proof of age and course must be possessed while operating a personal watercraft.” For the safety of all, please abide by the above law.


